


## FOREWORD

The material presented in this report is based in large part on data collected by the Bureau of the Census in the 1950 and 1960 Censuses of Population and Housing. It provides a wealth of essential benchmark data on the nonwhite population and how it is housed.

These data should prove invaluable to those who wish to explore the problem in depth, and analyze the changes and trends that have taken place in this field. It will also provide a point of departure for gauging the rate and extent of improvement in housing opportunities among the nonwhites which result from carrying out the spirit as well as the letter of the Executive Order on Equal Opportunity in Housing signed by President Kennedy on November 20, 1962

Gains were made in nonwhite housing conditions, it is true, between 1950 and 1960. Yet a look at the facts makes it clear that as a group the nonwhites remain far less satisfactorily housed than whites. The goal of a decent home for every American family is an accepted national objective. The facts and figures in this report on the status of housing opportunity in 1960 documents how far we still have to go to make this goal a reality for the nonwhite population.

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

## POPULATION CHARACTERISTICS

Fully to appreciate the developments which have taken place during the decade of the 1950's in the housing of nonwhites, it is essential to look briefly at the size and characteristics of this section of the population and how it too has changed over time.

### NONWHITES IN THE POPULATION

In 1960 the Census counted nearly 20.5 million nonwhites in the United States which meant that they approximated 11 percent of the total population. This percentage of the total population accounted for by nonwhites was midway in the range of 10 to 12 percent which has prevailed in each census since 1900 (table 1).\*

A look at the record for the past two decades, however, indicates that in the recent past the nonwhites have been increasing at a significantly faster rate than have whites.

In fact, the increase in nonwhite population during the decade of the 1950's accounted for more than one-fifth of the 20.5 million for the entire Nation in 1960. Among whites only about one-seventh of the 1960 count was attributable to the gains in the preceding 10 years.

While the nonwhite population is comprised of a number of racial groups including the Chinese, Japanese, and American Indians, Ne-

groes accounted for 92 percent of the group in 1960. Looked at regionally, the figures show that except in the West where the Chinese and Japanese are found in heavier concentrations, more than 95 percent of the nonwhites are Negroes.

**MIGRATION OF THE NONWHITES**

At the turn of the century, 87 percent of the nonwhite population was concentrated in the South and most of these were on farms. Over the years the quest for greater economic opportunity has prompted increasing numbers of the nonwhites, especially the Negroes, to leave the South. They have not only left the South but they have also left the farms in all regions.

In the decade of the 1950's alone, nearly 1.5 million nonwhites left the South (table 2). The largest numbers moved into the North Central region and into the Northeast.

Looked at by States, the heaviest movements took place out of the rural areas of Mississippi, Alabama, and South Carolina, and into the urban centers in California, New York, and Illinois.

**GEOGRAPHIC DISTRIBUTION OF NONWHITES**

Reflecting these shifts, the 1960 census found only 56 percent of the total nonwhite population in the South and increasing proportions in the other regions.

The shifts away from the farms and into urban places by nonwhites were very pronounced during the decade of the 1950's. In the deep South, in addition to the movement out of the region, there was also a significant movement into the cities. Elsewhere around the country the influx of nonwhites led to very substantial gains in their absolute and relative representation in the urban population where the increases consistently outran those for the white population (table 4).

As a result of these shifts the 1960 urban nonwhite population stood at 14.8 million, a gain of 4.8 million over 1950. The rural nonwhite population in contrast dropped 600,000, from 6.2 million to 5.6 million.

### CENTRAL CITY CONCENTRATION

As the nonwhites have moved into urban places, they have tended to gravitate into the central cities. Some 10.3 million, or slightly more than half the nonwhite population, lived in such communities in 1960, a gain of 63 percent over 1950 (table 5). Among the whites, on the other hand, there has been a shift from the cities to the suburbs for many years, with the result that less than one-third of the white population in 1960 lived in central cities.

Looked at from the standpoint of the Nation's 212 standard metropolitan statistical areas, the figures again show sharply divergent patterns for the white and nonwhite section of the population. Among the whites, 52 percent lived outside of the central cities, whereas in the case of nonwhites, 78 percent lived in the central cities, only 22 percent in the suburbs (table 6).

Only in one region, the South, do more whites live in central cities than in the suburbs of SMSA's. Among the nonwhites, on the other hand, the proportion living in central cities consistently exceeds that for the balance of the SMSA's. As the examination into the housing condition of the nonwhites will demonstrate, the failure of many nonwhite families to move into suburban communities was not necessarily due to a preference for the central city environment. Rather it reflected a lack of housing available to them in most suburban areas.

Some 4.9 million nonwhites—roughly one-fourth of all nonwhites and one-third of the urban nonwhite population in 1960—were concentrated in the Nation's 10 largest cities (table 7).

Had cities been ranked by the size of their nonwhite population instead of by city size, the only changes in the list would be the substitution of New Orleans, with its 235,000 nonwhites, for St. Louis (table 8).

Further evidence of the extent to which the nonwhites have been drawn to these large cities is the fact that during the 10 years 1950 to 1960, their numbers in the 10 largest cities increased by some 56 percent, while the white population was declining by more than 8 percent. As a result, all of the net gain in population for the 10 cities was attributable to the nonwhites (table 7).

## EARNINGS

As has been suggested earlier, one of the compelling reasons for the movement away from the farms and into the cities and out of the South and into the North and West has been the quest for greater economic opportunity.

In both 1949 and 1959 the earning opportunities as reflected in median incomes were poorest in the South, best in the North—which includes the industrial States of Illinois, Michigan, Ohio, and Indiana—and the West (table 11). It was, as has already been shown, to these two regions that the heaviest migration took place during the decade of the 1950's.

Reflecting both a general rise in income levels and the geographic shifts which occurred, median incomes of nonwhite women rose sharply from approximately \$584 in 1949 to \$909 in 1959, a gain of 56 percent. Median income of white women, on the other hand, rose only 27 percent. Outside the South a very significant change which occurred was the virtual elimination of the gap between the earnings of white and nonwhite women.

Among the men the situation is less good. Here nonwhite median incomes tended to advance only about as fast as that of all men. Absolute figures show the unsatisfactory improvement in earnings of nonwhite men.

Even after a 70-percent rise between 1949 and 1959, the median incomes of nonwhite men were still less than \$2,300.

## EDUCATION AND ITS INFLUENCE ON EARNINGS

While substantial strides have been made over the past 20 years in bettering the education of nonwhites, the fact remains that in 1960 only half as many nonwhites—relatively 8 percent—had had at least 1 year of college, as was true for whites—17 percent.

Sixty percent of them, in fact, still had no more than a grammar school education compared to only 40 percent among the whites (table 15).

The fact that race is less of a limiting factor on earnings among women than men no doubt is a reflection of the fact that nonwhite

women as a group are better educated than nonwhite men. Thus, in 1960 out of the nonwhite women aged 25 or older, there were 2.2 million who had at least some high schooling. Among nonwhite men there were only 1.7 million who had gone this far in school.

While the education lag was worst among rural nonwhites, the important fact remains that far fewer of the nonwhites in urban areas had completed high school or gone on to college than was true of their white counterparts (table 16).

## OCCUPATIONS

The educational lag is clearly reflected in the types of occupations most common to the two races (table 17). In the urban population, for example, where 23 percent of the white workers were in professional, technical, or management positions, only 8 percent of the nonwhites were similarly employed. Among the skilled craftsmen the ratio of whites so employed—14 percent— was double that for nonwhites—7 percent. At the other end of the wage scale, close to 50 percent of the urban nonwhite workers were employed as household or service trade workers and in other similarly low paid jobs. In addition, nearly one-eighth the nonwhite were unskilled laborers in contrast with less than 4 percent of white workers who were so employed. Looked at geographically, the pattern appears to be about the same in metropolitan centers throughout the United States (table 18).

## INDUSTRY GROUPS

The heavier concentration of nonwhites in the lower skilled jobs is reflected in the industries in which they work. Thus, the proportion of nonwhites in the service industries, with their preponderance of unskilled workers—23 percent—was roughly triple that for whites—8 percent. In fact the service industries, including housework, rank first among the employers of nonwhites. In contrast, manufacturing,

which ranks as the largest employer of white workers—28 percent—provides jobs for less than 19 percent of all employed nonwhite workers (table 19).

## PLACE OF WORK

No doubt reflecting the combined effect of the lower proportion of skilled and professional workers among the nonwhite and of their greater concentration in central cities, there is a lesser tendency among nonwhite than among white workers to work outside the county in which they live (table 20). As might be expected, this is particularly true in urban areas where among those reporting their place of employment, the Census Bureau found that only 9 percent of the nonwhites worked outside the county in which they lived.

Among white workers, as the text table above indicates, the proportion—15 percent—was nearly double that for nonwhites. A slightly higher share of the nonwhites living in rural areas are obliged to seek work outside the county in which they live, but here again the proportion is substantially below that for white workers.

## FAMILY INCOME

While the nonwhites still are economically disadvantaged compared with the whites, so that a disproportioned share of them fall in the low income category, sight should not be lost of the considerable progress which has been made in upgrading family incomes. Reflecting the effect of multiple earners in many households, the figures show that outside the South there were appreciable numbers of nonwhite families with incomes in excess of \$4,300 (table 13). In fact, in the West the median income of nonwhites in 1960 ran in excess of \$4,900. Income at these levels can put families in a position to be in the market for homes of their own.

## HOUSEHOLD COMPOSITION AND SIZE

Before turning specifically to the housing situation among the nonwhites, some consideration should be directed to the household

composition among the nonwhites, since it has a bearing upon their present and prospective housing requirements.

In 1960 there were 5.2 million nonwhite households compared with 47.9 million white households. Some 77 percent, or 4.0 million, of the nonwhite households lived in urban areas, compared with 72 percent of their white counterparts. The nonwhite households are generally larger with an average of 3.85 persons per household, compared with 3.23 for white households. Within urban areas nonwhite households have an average of 3.63 persons versus 3.13 for white households.

Nonwhite persons are less frequently heads or the wives of heads and consequently more frequently are living in households as other relatives of the head or as nonrelatives. For nonwhites those who are not heads or wives of heads account for 57 percent of the urban nonwhite population, while only 46 percent of the white population falls in this group. The percent of persons living in group quarters, which are principally roominghouses, is about the same for both groups (table 21).

Between 1950 and 1960 the percent of nonwhite married couples who are without their own households dropped from 17 to 5 percent and now is only 3 percentage points above the white proportion (table 22).

The proportion of nonwhite married couples with their own children under 18 years of age is only moderately higher for nonwhite as compared with white households. However, nonwhite married couples (husband-wife families) make up only 75 percent of all nonwhite families, while white married couples make up 89 percent of all white families (table 23).

## HOUSING

The great changes between 1950 and 1960 in the number, the geographic distribution, and the earnings of nonwhite persons and families were accompanied by equally significant changes in their housing situation. While important gains were made during the decade, much remains to be done before the nonwhite as a group are all satisfactorily housed.

## HOMEOWNERSHIP

The rate of homeownership is perhaps the single most meaningful statistic that can be used to sum up the overall housing conditions under which families live. Homeownership, as opposed to a rental status, generally is associated with more amenities, both within the dwelling and in its environment, more room, pride of ownership, and a certain degree of social status. Over the decade of the 1950's, nonwhites did improve their position in this regard as homeowner-

ship edged upward from 35 percent in 1950 to 38 percent in 1960 (table 24).

The improvement was not, however, as great as that recorded by white householders where the sharp rise in the number of homeowners brought the proportion of owners up from 57 to 64 percent (tables 24 through 28).

Looked at by region, the figures show that the highest percentage of nonwhite homeownership was in the West, the lowest percentage in the Northeast.

## HOUSING QUALITY

One of the brighter aspects of the change in the housing status of nonwhite families between 1950 and 1960 is the improvement that took place during the decade in the physical condition of housing which they occupied. The proportion of standard units—units that are not dilapidated and have private toilet and bath and hot running water—occupied by nonwhite families rose from only slightly more than one-fourth to over one-half of the units occupied by nonwhites (table 29). Even in comparison with the rise in standard units occupied by white families, which rose from 68 to 87 percent of all occupied units, the gain is impressive. Nonwhite renters gained somewhat more relative to white renters than did nonwhite to white owners, probably reflecting to a large extent the effects of the migration of nonwhites to urban areas where housing conditions are generally

better than in rural areas. With comparatively fewer nonwhites now remaining in rural areas as compared with 1950, further upgrading of nonwhite housing will become increasingly dependent on the ability to step up the quality of the units occupied by the nonwhites now living within urban areas, rather than merely upon moving families out of poor rural housing to better city units.

On a relative basis, units occupied by nonwhites in the South were most improved during the decade. Despite this the quality of nonwhite housing in the South still lagged far behind that in any other region. While the improvement during the 1950's in the quality of housing occupied by nonwhites was clearly encouraging, 2.3 million, or 44 percent, of the units occupied by nonwhites were still sub-standard in 1960 (table 29). An additional 0.6 million nonwhite units counted as standard had defects that could be corrected only by repair over and above ordinary maintenance. Thus, units occupied

by nonwhites account for 2.3 million, or 27 percent, out of the total of 8.5 million substandard units, while all nonwhite units account for only 10 percent of all occupied units. Of the deteriorating units classified as standard in 1960, the nonwhite units accounted for 0.6 million, or 15 percent, of the total of 4.1 million units in the group.

## EXTENT OF CROWDING

Another indication of the adequacy of housing is the relationship of family size to the size of housing unit. It is useful first to review what has happened to family size. Between 1950 and 1960, the median size of nonwhite families remained about the same while white families were becoming smaller. The median size of nonwhite owner families remained at 3.3 persons and renters at 2.9 persons, while white owner families decreased from 3.2 persons to 3.1 persons and white renters decreased from 2.8 to 2.4 (table 32). Even more revealing is the detail on the change in the distribution of the number of persons in white and nonwhite renter families during the 1950's. Only in the one-person nonfarm renter units did the increase in white families approach the nonwhite increase. There was actually a decline in three- and 4-person white nonfarm renters during the period. Among large nonwhite households—those with six or more persons—on the other hand, increases ranging from 74 to more than 100 percent were recorded (table 34).

While the median size of nonwhite families remained the same during the 1950's, a better matching of these families with housing units gave more of them space to stretch out. This is shown by the decrease from 32 to 27 percent in the proportion of overcrowded units (units with 1.01 or more persons per room) occupied by nonfarm, nonwhite families. The decrease in the proportion of overcrowded nonwhite families was not impressive, however, when compared with the

decrease in the degree of overcrowding among white families for whom the percent overcrowded dropped by one-third, from 12 percent in 1950 to 8 percent in 1960. In fact, among nonwhite families the number of overcrowded units increased over the decade from nearly 1 million in 1950 to 1.3 million in 1960, while the number of overcrowded white families decreased by about 0.2 million (table 34).

The contrast between white and nonwhite families is sharper when the comparison is limited to seriously overcrowded units—units with 1.51 or more persons per room. Between 1950 and 1960, seriously overcrowded, nonwhite units decreased from 18 to 13 percent of all nonwhite units, but seriously overcrowded white units fell from 4.3 to 2.4 percent of all white units. At the end of the period there were 85,000 additional seriously overcrowded nonwhite housing units. On the other hand, there were 380,000 fewer seriously overcrowded white units (table 34).

### YEAR MOVED INTO UNIT

Considering the marked movement out of the South and into the North and West during the decade of the 1950's, it is not surprising to find that more than one-third of the nonwhite households had moved during the 2¼ years which preceded the 1960 census. In fact, only a little over a quarter of the nonwhite households enumerated in 1960 had lived in the same unit in 1949.

While the overall pattern of the year units were moved into appears quite similar for nonwhites and whites, a more detailed look at the situation shows very marked disparities in the nature of the moves made by the two groups. Thus between March 1959 and March 1960, less than one-fourth of the nonwhite movers moved from one housing unit to another in a different county, while over one-half of the white movers made such a move. Since many of the suburban areas of large metropolitan areas are located in a county different from the central city, the greater tendency of whites to go from one county to another no doubt reflects their movement to the suburbs.

Of those nonwhite families who moved during the period 1958 through March 1960, the largest single category moved into rental units inside standard metropolitan statistical areas (table 35).

## AGE OF UNITS

It was suggested earlier that the concentration of nonwhites in central cities, in contrast with the white families who are moving more and more to the suburbs, was not necessarily entirely voluntary. In part, it no doubt reflects the necessity of the nonwhites with their lower level of income to seek out older housing within their price range. Much of such housing is in central cities. Unquestionably another factor involved was the general lack of open occupancy during the 1950's in most of the new housing built in the suburbs. Hence, out of the 3.7 million nonwhite families who moved between 1950 and 1960, only 843,000 or 23 percent, were able to move into units built during that decade. In contrast, out of roughly 19 million white families who moved into owner units during this period, nearly 11 million, or 58 percent, moved into a house or apartment built between 1950 and 1960 (table 36).

This tendency to move into older units certainly has been a factor associated with the lower quality of the nonwhite housing.

## TYPE OF STRUCTURE

Reflecting the higher proportion of renters in their midst, nonwhite families tend more toward multifamily units than do whites. Thus, in 1960, of the total number of units occupied by nonwhites, one-third moved into structures with two or more units. Among white families, less than one-fourth of the moves were into units of this type (table 36).

While not of major significance in assessing the housing situation among the nonwhites, it is interesting to note that for them trailer living is a rarity. Out of 5.1 million households, only 11,000 lived in trailers. This was only slightly more than 1 percent of the total number of trailers in use in 1960. Among white households in contrast, more than three-quarters of a million lived in trailers or mobile homes at the time of the last census.

## RENTS AND VALUES

While the rents paid by nonwhite tenants and the value of homes owned by nonwhite owners more than doubled between 1950 and 1960, they still continued to run far below the comparable figures for housing occupied by white families (table 37).

Here again the lower level of rents and values is a reflection of the poorer quality of much of the housing in which nonwhite families are still obliged to live. These disparities in rents and values in 1950 and again in 1960 do not, however, fully reflect differences in the quality of the housing occupied by the two races. Because of limitations in the availability of housing to nonwhites, the rents and values of units they occupy often tend to run well above the levels at which houses of comparable quality can be obtained by white families. Now as the effects of Federal, State, and local actions to assure equality of opportunity in housing are increasingly felt, these inflations in rents and values of housing available to nonwhites should be narrowed and ultimately erased.




