Brownsville 1 of 7 American Cities Selected for Federal Help Program

The contraction of the national economy in the late 2000s might have ended, but the federal government is still working to ease the struggles of American cities affected by the 2008 recession as officials announced this week the expansion of the Strong Cities, Strong Communities initiative. Brownsville is among seven cities to be included in the program and will receive individualized assistance in realizing its economic vision. The initiative assists cities that have remained resilient and developed strategies for growth despite economic difficulties. The program, which is headed by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development and the White House Domestic Policy Council, puts federal officials in city halls across the country to help communities grow.

Brownsville Named to Strong Cities, Strong Communities List

Government officials in Washington this week announced Brownsville and a half-dozen other cities will be the newest municipalities taking place in the Strong Cities, Strong Communities initiative, a federal effort to assist cities struggling with economic divestment in the aftermath of the recession. The initiative, led by U.S. Housing and Urban Development, will put a team of federal employees on the ground in Brownsville to help the city navigate federal regulations and pursue the vision outlined in its 2009 Imagine Brownsville comprehensive plan. Brownsville was selected from an initial list of 91 municipalities struggling nationwide to be included in the program, which will begin this month.

Brownsville Selected for Strong Cities, Strong Communities Initiative KRGV

Brownsville was one of seven U.S. cities selected in the expansion of the Strong Cities, Strong Communities Initiative. The program aims to support the cities' vision for economic growth and development. "The goal is to help position these communities to be more economically competitive, which ultimately will create better opportunities and improve the lives for their residents," said Domestic Policy Council Director Cecilia Muñoz. Federal inter-agency expert teams work alongside city leaders, community organizations and local businesses. AmeriCorps VISTA members help as liaisons with local leaders and residents to implement solutions to a community's needs. Teams helped the program's original pilot cities more effectively use more than \$368 million in existing federal funds and investments. Brownsville Mayor Antonio Martinez said the community's eager to work with the community solutions team.

Officials Laud Federal Initiative Program

Local and federal government officials were in front of Brown sville City Hall Tuesday afternoon to taut the city's entry into the Strong Cities, Strong Communities program. Last week's announcement marked Brownsville's entry into the federal initiative, which will bring federal employees to town in an effort to help jumpstart city projects. The program aims to help local governments in cities across the country navigate the bureaucracy associated with large projects. Which agency will help Brownsville hasn't been announced, but U.S. Rep. Filemon Vela noted the many examples of how federal guidance could help the city with projects already in progress. As the city awaits an environmental assessment from the Federal Aviation Administration concerning efforts to bring a SpaceX launch pad to Boca Chica Beach, the Port of Brownsville is dredging its channel and the municipal airport is planning an expansion, Vela said, noting that all require clearance from Washington in some way or another.

Flint Gets \$1.9 Million More to Transform Chevy in the Hole Eyesore Into Massive Public Park

The city will use a new \$1.9-million grant from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency to clean up the old General Motors' Chevy in the Hole site and redevelop it into <u>Chevy</u> <u>Commons</u>, a massive park with nature trails and fishing spots. Mayor Dayne Walling announced the funding during a groundbreaking today, Sept. 26, for Oak Street Senior Apartments, using the new award as an example of the potential for more federal help here because of the <u>Strong</u> <u>Cities, Strong Communities program</u> that Flint was selected for in January. Strong Cities is a federal program that targets financially distressed cities, providing them with technical advice and expertise from the federal government. "These new funds will expand the area we can cover with trees and walking paths. We are making the right connections" to secure assistance through the Strong Cities program, Walling said. The Chevy Commons grant has actually been awarded to the Genesee County Land Bank, said federal officials at today's ceremony. It will allow for work on the second phase of plans for transforming the former General Motors property to a massive public park with walking paths, called Chevy Commons.

<u>Strong Cities, Strong Communities Federal Initiative to Better Use Resources Launches in</u> <u>Flint</u>

Federal government representatives launched the Strong Cities, Strong Communities initiative Friday morning in Flint in an effort to make improvements throughout the city. In January, Flint was chosen to be a part of the program, which was launched by the Obama administration in 2011. The initiative calls upon experts from federal agencies to address problems within distressed cities. They work alongside city leadership, community organizations, local business and philanthropic foundations to support the cities' visions for economic growth and development. A key goal is to help officials make better use of existing resources. An important factor in Flint's selection was the new Imagine Flint Master Plan, which laid out a clear plan for the city's recovery, according to Shaun Donovan, secretary of the Department of Housing and Urban Development. The Flint Strong Cities, Strong Communities team will focus on helping neighborhoods become more stable, improving public safety and strengthening economic development. Two of the most important areas in which the team will seek to improve are crime and blight. Detroit was one of the cities initially chosen for the initiative, where it helped forward a light rail project and demolish blight.

\$1.9-Million Grant to Transform Old Flint GM Plant

A \$1.9-million grant will help transform the site of a former General Motors manufacturing complex in Flint known as "Chevy in the Hole" into parkland. <u>The Flint Journal reports</u> Mayor Dayne Walling announced the funding last week, saying the new award as an example of the potential for more federal help because of the federal "Strong Cities, Strong Communities" program. The money for the Genesee County Land Bank is from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency. The site is being called Chevy Commons. Manufacturing began at the "Chevy in the Hole" site in 1904 and, at its peak, the factories employed thousands. The last factory buildings were demolished a decade ago by auto parts supplier Delphi, and work has been taking place for years to prepare the site.

HUD's Visit Highlights Strong Partnership

The 12-story Sheraton has been vacant for nearly 30 years. HUD's Castro Pledges Federal Aid to Revitalize Gary

New U.S. Housing and Urban Development Secretary Julian Castro has only been on the job for four weeks, but on Wednesday Castro made Gary his first visit of a nationwide tour of cities and regions which are creating opportunities for residents through local and federal partnerships and collaboration. "Gary has great potential given its location, Castro said. "There's a can-do spirit in terms of leadership and a strong partnership, not only with HUD, but the state and the federal government. My hope is this project and others will help catalyze more private sector investment as well. HUD is here to be a strong partner to make opportunity happen." Castro took office last month and was ceremonially sworn in Monday by Vice President Joe Biden. Castro, the former mayor of San Antonio, joined Mayor Karen Freeman-Wilson for a news conference across the street from the former Sheraton Hotel, which currently undergoing demolition. The demolition is part of the "Strong Cities, Strong Communities" initiative announced by President Barack Obama in January. Other projects include partnerships with the EPA on stormwater mitigation and environmental cleanup in Miller and brownfields assessment and remediation in Gary, Hammond and East Chicago. Over the next decade, we plan to partner with the Federal Transit Administration to build the West Lake Corridor. This extension of the South Shore commuter rail line will take more than 5,000 riders to high-paying jobs in Chicago every day. They will bring back nearly \$150 million in annual income to spend here in Northwest Indiana, an economic boost that will add nearly 2,000 non-commuter jobs in the region.

HUD Secretary Castro Visits Gary

The newly appointed Secretary of Housing and Urban Development Julian Castro was in Gary today meeting with local officials as part of his nationwide visits to cities collaborating with his agency to improve their communities. Castro got the opportunity to view the Sheraton Hotel demolition that is underway, and says the project is the kind of catalytic efforts HUD supports in order to revitalize communities and create jobs. Castro says he chose to visit Gary first because of their strong partnership and the work the city is doing to create jobs and places residents can afford, as well as the city's efforts to revitalize the downtown. HUD, the EPA, the City of Gary, and the Northwest Indiana Regional Development Authority, have all partnered to fund the removal of the 14 story eye sore, located on Broadway next to Gary City Hall, that has been vacant for nearly three decades.

Gary Launches Obama Administration Assistance Program

In January, the Obama administration chose Gary as one of seven economically distressed cities to take part in the Strong Cities, Strong Communities Initiative in which the federal government sends a team of experts from different agencies to work with local leaders on revitalization projects to help strengthen a community's economy. "It allows us to really build on the work that has been done by our city administration," Mayor Karen Freeman-Wilson said. U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development Regional Administrator Antonio Riley said the initiative will focus on three areas in Gary: the Northside redevelopment project for the Horace Mann and Emerson downtown neighborhoods and the lakefront district consisting of the Aetna, Glen Ryan and Miller neighborhoods; making Gary data-driven by providing the tools to manage central data and sharing it publicly; and the University Park project including enhancements to the Indiana University Northwest and Ivy Tech campuses and commercial development along the Broadway corridor. Included is a study to determine the feasibility of a trauma center. "We are looking closely with Mayor Freeman-Wilson and her team to identify other priorities and mechanisms by which the SC2 team can further support the economic revitalization of this great city," Riley said. "The bottom line is the Obama administration is committed to the revitalization of Gary to make it a stronger and safer community and a community of opportunity for its residents."

Gary Added to Strong Cities, Strong Communities Program

Leaders of local redevelopment organizations hailed a new inrush of federal expertise to Macon-Bibb County on Wednesday, sitting down to a series of business meetings even before a welcoming reception. First Armstrong Superfund Cleanup Plans Finalized

Armstrong World Industries will take the first step next year in containing old cancer-causing pollutants that have fouled Rocky Creek for years. Several old landfills on Armstrong's Guy Paine Road property are the source of polychlorinated biphenyls, or PCBs, that have contaminated soil and water in the area, according to the federal Environmental Protection Agency.PCBs can travel up the food chain and remain stored in living tissue. Rocky Creek has high enough PCB levels that the state has warned people against fishing there, although the stream remains a popular fishing spot.
