


National housing market indicators available as of January show continuing recovery in housing markets. Trends in some of the top indicators for this month include:

- Purchases of new homes dropped in December, but sales for all of 2016 were much stronger than a year earlier. New singlefamily home sales fell 10.4 percent in December to 536,000 (SAAR) from an upwardly revised 598,000 pace the prior month and were virtually the same as a year earlier. Purchases of new single-family homes, at 563,000 for all of 2016, were well above (12.4 percent) the 501,000 annual pace the previous year and the strongest since 2007. Note that monthly data on new home sales can be volatile and are often revised. (Source: HUD and Census Bureau).
- Sales of previously owned (existing) homes softened in December, but sales for the full year were the strongest in a decade. The National Association of Realtors® (NAR) reported that sales of existing homes (including single-family homes, townhomes, condominiums, and cooperatives) fell 2.8 percent in December to 5.49 million (SAAR) from 5.65 million in November but were still slightly higher (0.7 percent) than a year ago. Purchases of existing homes reached 5.45 million for all of 2016, up 3.8 percent from 2015 and the highest pace since 2006.
- Single-family construction starts were down in December, but reached the strongest annual pace in nine years for all of 2016. Single-family housing starts, at 795,000 homes (SAAR), were down 4.0 percent from November but up 3.9 percent from one year ago. Construction starts for multifamily housing (5 or more units in a structure), at 417,000 units (SAAR), were up 53.9 percent from November and 10.3 percent from a year earlier. Note that month-to-month changes in the construction of multifamily homes can be volatile. For all of 2016, single-family housing starts increased 9.3 percent from the previous year to 780,900 units, the highest yearly pace since 2007; multifamily starts, at 373,800 homes, were down 3.1 percent from 2015. - Home prices were up again in November with annual house price changes remaining fairly stable in a 5- to 6-percent range. The Federal Housing Finance Agency (FHFA) seasonally adjusted purchase-only house price index for November estimated that home values rose 0.5 percent over the previous month and 6.1 percent over the previous

- year, down slightly from an annual gain of 6.2 percent in October. The FHFA index shows that U.S. home values are now 6.5 percent above their previous peak set in March 2007 and stand 34.6 percent above the low point reached in May 2011. Another index tracked in the Monthly Update, the non-seasonally adjusted CoreLogic Case-Shiller 20-City Home Price Index, posted a 0.2 percent month-over-month change in home values in November and year-over-year returns of 5.3 percent, which was slightly higher than the 5.1 percent annual change in October. The CoreLogic-Case-Shiller index shows home values are at their highest levels since October 2007; house prices peaked during the housing bubble in July 2006 according to this index. (The FHFA and CoreLogic-Case-Shiller price indices are released with a 2-month lag).
- Foreclosure completions fell in December, while foreclosure starts saw a slight increase. Lenders started the public foreclosure process on 35,628 U.S. properties in December, a slight increase (1 percent) over November but down 15 percent from a year earlier. Newly initiated foreclosures for all of 2016 were down 16 percent from 2015 and have been below the pre-crisis (2005 and 2006) monthly average of 52,280 since March 2015. Lenders completed the foreclosure process (bank repossessions or REOs) on 29,303 U.S. properties in December, a decline of 8 percent from the previous month and 26 percent from a year ago. The pre-crisis average of foreclosure completions was 23,120 properties a month. Yearover-year foreclosure completions have declined for ten consecutive months. Annual foreclosure completions had declined for 27 consecutive months before starting to increase in March 2015; they began to decline again in March 2016. Foreclosure completions for all of 2016 were down 16 percent from 2015. Note that foreclosure activity has been volatile in recent months as states with a substantial pool of foreclosure inventory move to reduce the backlog. - The U.S. homeownership rate rebounded for the second consecutive quarter. The national homeownership rate, at 63.7 percent in the fourth quarter of 2016, increased from 63.5 percent in the third quarter but was still down slightly from 63.8 one year earlier. Beginning with the fourth quarter of 2013, the homeownership rate declined for seven straight quarters but has been fluctuating since. Homeownership reached a peak of 69.2 percent in the second and fourth quarters of 2004. (Source: Census Bureau).

























A value of 100 means that a renter household with median income has exactly enough income to qualify for a lease on a median-priced rental home. B. Notes on Charts.

- 1. Monthly house price trends shown as changes in respective house price indices applied to a common base price set equal to the median price of an existing home sold in January 2003 as reported by the National Association of Realtors. Indices shown: S&P/Case Shiller 20-metro composite index (NSA), January 2000 = 100, FHFA monthly (purchase-only) index for US (SA), January 1991 = 100, and CoreLogic-Distressed Sales Excluded (Monthly) for US (NSA), January 2000 = 100. Also see additional note below in Section C on the CoreLogic HPI.
- 2. Reported seasonally adjusted annual rates for new and existing home sales.
- 3. A comparison of the affordability of renting a home to purchasing a home, added as of the September 2016 release. HUD's Quarterly Rental Affordability Index is compared to NAR's Composite Quarterly Affordability Index. See note above on Rental Affordability.
- 4. Filings of a notice of default or scheduled foreclosure auction, depending on which action starts the foreclosure process in a state, are reported for foreclosure starts. Foreclosure completions are properties entering REO. Both as reported by ATTOM Data Solutions (formerly RealtyTrac).
- FHA market shares as FHA purchase and refinance originations divided by HUD estimates of purchase and refinance mortgage originations as noted in "Mortgage Originations" above. See additional note below on FHA market share.

C. Additional Notes.

FHA market share estimates are based on new methodology beginning with the October 2013 report; estimates were revised back through Q1 2011. The estimate for first-time buyers was revised upward from 32 percent in 2015 to 35 percent in 2016 with the October 2016 release of the NAR Profile of Home Buyers and Sellers 2016 report.

Corelogic's House Price Index (HPI) estimates are based on new methodology beginning with their June 2016 report, which includes data through April 2016. A variety of modeling and other enhancements to their HPI and its forecast, including a 14 percent expansion in the number of transaction pairs, were made
